TE HAERENGA KI RATANA PĀ

Our haerenga to Ratana Pā was full of learning, personal growth and lots of travelling. In total we travelled 1700kms over 5 days which is the longest trip we have ever driven with our kura. They did not complain once about the early morning risings, the long distance travelling, the packing, the unpacking numerous times as we stayed at different places. They just did it without complaint. The amount of positive feedback we received about our student's behavior was humbling and we can all be proud of the way they represented our kura and our iwi.

Our journey started in the early dark hours of Thursday morning 2 June. A huge thank you to whānau for getting here on time and allowing us to get on the road as early as possible. The weather did not want to cooperate with us on this morning but we got it done and managed to leave on time. We were doing good timing so we pushed straight through Auckland before rush hour traffic built up. Then because we were doing so good with our timing, we thought it would be a really good idea to take a scenic tour

around Hamilton....in other words we got lost LOL but we eventually found our way again thanks to google maps. Finally arriving at our destination Whakarewarewa School at 5.00pm, we were warmly welcomed by our hosts; Jackie Meha, Boxer Schuster, Anaru Ratapu and Maimoa artist Kaaterama Pou. We were spoilt for dinner with a yummy hangi cooked in the steam pit



of Whakarewarewa Village by our hosts. Following that delicious kai, we headed off to Motion Entertainment for some laser tag and ten bowling fun. It was awesome to see the kids relax and unwind after a long day

travelling. The next morning we were treated to a guided tour by our whanaunga Boxer through Whakarewarewa Village. This is an expensive tourist

attraction and we were privileged to be guided by a local resident. In November this year, we look forward to welcoming these same whanaunga to our kainga and we will return the same manaakitanga they bestowed upon us. After our awesome tour of the Whakarewarewa Village, we were off to Rotorua Skyline to try our luge skills down the slopes of the hill. The weather was a little drizzly but it didn't deter our little racers one bit! 2 hours later, we were eating hot steak and sausages



cooked on our bbq in the carpark. It was a good time to fuel ourselves up before the next part of our journey to Ratana Pā. This was the longest leg of the journey, we went past Taupo and stopped in Turangi for a toilet and stretch break. Then through Desert Road but we were unable to see Mt Ruapehu due to low clouds. A quick stop at the Waiouru National Army Museum for a photo opportunity on the war tanks before our last drive to Ratana Pā.





Arriving safely at Te Pā o Ngā Ariki 5.00pm, we were relieved to finally be there. Our first task upon arriving at the Pā is to give thanks for our safe arrival, so we went into the temepara to pray for our blessings. It is truly a great wonder to sit in this magnificent temple built almost 100 years ago. Following a warm whakatau by haukainga of the pā, we met up with some of our whānau from Te Kao; Pāpā Heta Conrad, Pāpā Brian and Nanny Meri Wiki, Maringinoa Wood, Morehu Kaaka, Huia Cooper and Pāpā Joe Everitt. I don't think we were quite prepared for the cold shock that greeted us that evening because everyone got ready for bed and stayed in their beds under the warmth of their blankets. But it was a well deserved rest for us after another long day of travelling. The next morning saw us sleeping in to 6.30am and getting ready for a relaxing day exploring and learning about Ratana Pā. We were very lucky to be given a history kōrero from Kereama Pene who has a wealth of knowledge about the Ratana faith. Our tamariki were very intrigued by his korero and sat quietly listening to him for an easy hour. Following a hot soup for lunch to warm ourselves up, we loaded up the vans and went for a tiki tour to Whanganui. We spent the

afternoon in the warm sun playing at Kowhai Park. But the coolest surprise at this park was riding the mini train. I'm not sure who had the most fun here...pictures may show it was the adults who were the most excited but I'm pretty sure it was all about the kids. Pretty sure. Our last night in the pā was another cold one. When you're at the pā, you have to at least once go and look for the angels. So we put every bit of warm clothing we had on, grabbed a blanket and walked behind the temepara in the dark to

look for angels. Whilst most will argue we only saw car lights, if you believe you saw one then you believe what you saw. We returned back to the warmth of our beds and rested for Matua Hemi's big day ahead of us. We rose at 7.00am on Sunday morning to a low of 4 degrees. I don't think anyone had ever been this cold before. We had a lovely hot breakfast which we all needed to get through the next part of our day. We dressed tidily in our no 1 school uniforms, loaded the vans and cleaned our area. Then we gathered outside and waited for the service ceremony to begin at 11.00am. At 10.50 am Te Reo o Arepa began the procession march from the Manuao to the Temepara and our tamariki were privileged to walk directly behind the band which is normally proceeded by the hierarchy of the church and Apotoro rehita but they were always treated kindly by the people of the church. We were proud to have front row seats to witness Matua Hemi being ordained alongside our whanaunga Apiata Brown from Te Hapua. It was truly a momentous occasion. Following the ceremony we gathered outside the front gateway and took many photos to mark this special occasion. A quick change into some comfy warm clothes and we were off on the road again back to Rotorua for the night. We arrived in good time around 5.00pm, enough time unload our bags, set up our beds and get changed into our swimming gear for a nice hot soak at Polynesian Spa baths. Which is just what we needed after those freezing temperatures. Followed by a gourmet dinner prepared by Pāpā Anaru, x20 hot pizzas, chips and a drink we were ready for bed. Monday morning

we were ready to come home. Everyone rose at 6.00am and quickly packed down and loaded the vans eager to hit the road and get home. Arriving back in Te Kao before 4.30pm was a great relief to be home safe, sound and warm! Thank you to whānau for entrusting your tamariki to go with us, they are a credit to us all. We are super proud of them. Thank you to our kaimahi and kaiawhina for looking after all of our tamariki, and our drivers for getting us there and home safely.



















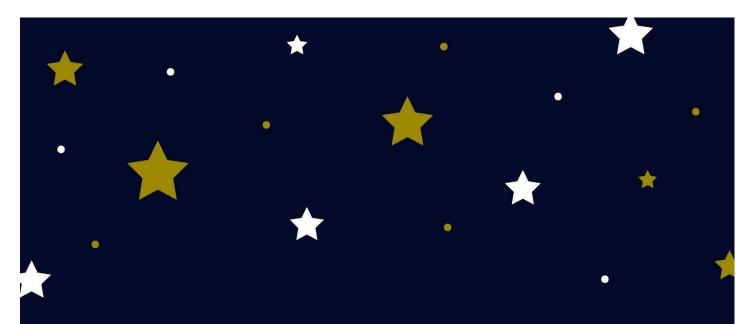
