This year had a fabulous line up of guest speakers such as; Dr. Rangi Mataamua, Dr. Linda Tuhiwai Smith, while Rob Ruha and Tweedie Waititi were our main guest speakers of the evening sharing with us the behind the scenes of translating The Lion King into Te Reo Māori. 


# TE WHAREKURA
